## **GARFIELD HOUSE**

### 41/43 PARK ROAD, SITTINGBOURNE

Notes on the ownership extracted from the deeds Michael H Peters March 2007

The following notes, extracted from the deeds of the property, provide an outline history of the site & the building which stands upon it. Daniel Wills, who built the house, was a brick maker & barge builder who, in partnership with Henry Packham, (great-grandfather to Robert Dixon & me) founded the business of Wills & Packham which they brought from Rainham to Sittingbourne around 1870

The building was named after James Abram Garfield, President of the United States of America who was shot by an assassin in 1881 – the year when the house was built. Daniel Wills & Henry Packham were admirers of Garfield & of William McKinley, another assassinated President, after whom they named one of their barges.

I have extracted the following from the deeds:

28<sup>th</sup> April 1806 THOMAS TONGE

by his will (after making pecuniary legacies & bequeathing a freehold estate in Shottenden Green in the parish of Chilham)

bequeathed the rest of his estate to his nephew

16<sup>th</sup> January 1807 probate in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury by

WILLIAM VALLANCE

lease & release (the customary means of conveying freeholds in

those days) of "Sittingbourne Fields"

30 acres in Sittingbourne & Milton

abutting towards the **north** on the great road leading from Sittingbourne to Rochester & on lands then late of John Brenchley Esqre & then of Mr John Smith & on lands then late

of Thomas Tonge gentleman & then of the said William

Vallance & on lands then late of James Tonge gentleman & then of Mr Thomas Walker

towards the **east** on lands of the said John Brenchley & the said John Smith & on lands sometime then since of Mary Trott widow then of William Twopenny Esgre

towards the south on a piece of land of the said William

Vallance & on lands then late of Gabriel Harpur Esqre & then of

Andrew Hawes Bradley

towards the **west** on the King's Highway leading from Milton to Tunstall & on the lands then late of the said James Tonge & then of the said Thomas Walker & on the said land then late of the said Thomas Tonge & then of the said William Vallance

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& also 7 acres abutting towards the **north** "Sittingbourne

Fields" above mentioned

towards the east on lands then late of the said Mary

Trott & of the said William Twopenny & on the said piece of land sometime then since of the said Gabriel Harpur & then of

the said Andrew Hawes Bradley

towards the **west** on the King's Highway from Milton to Tunstall towards the **south** on the piece of land last mentioned then late of the said Mary Trott & then of the said William Twopenny.

Most of the adjoining land was held by substantial land owners; Harpur & Bradley were successive owners of Gore Court; William Twopenny lived at Woodstock

30<sup>th</sup> December 1831 Will of THOMAS TONGE VALLANCE to SARAH

VALLANCE (his wife) for life & WILLIAM VALLANCE (his father) & JAMES VALLANCE (his brother) as trustees to sell &

then to his children equally

29<sup>th</sup> May 1839 SARAH VALLANCE died

27<sup>th</sup> October 1843 THOMAS TONGE VALLANCE died

The following entries in Italic have been struck through on the abstract of title as being irrelevant to Garfield House, but are included as being of interest to local historians.

20th November 1843 will of WILLIAM VALLANCE (see above) bequeathing

hís estate in Stamford Middlesexx, Westbrook , Lydd &

Old Romney to his son JAMES VALLANCE

Executors: were his wife MARY ANN & his surviving sons

JAMES & WILLIAM

21st February 1844 probate of will of THOMAS TONGE VALLANCE

obtained by JAMES VALLANCE (his brother)

23rd February 1849 WILLIAM VALLANCE died

16th March 1849 probate of his will obtained by his surviving sons

5th August 1857 by his will JAMES VALLANCE bequeathed all his freehold

Es copyhold hereditaments in Kent to his nephew THOMAS WILLIAM VALLANCE (son of THOMAS TONGE VALLANCE) subject to a life tenancy of his dwellinghouse at Sittingbourne for his wife (CATHERINE MARGARET) Named as Executors: his wife, his said nephew, brother

WILLIAM VALLANCE & GEORGE GROSVENOR

18th November 1858 Probate obtained

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28th May 1860

CATHERINE MARGARET VALLANCE, of Cavendish Square, Middlesex & Sittingbourne, widow of JAMES VALLANCE & Rev WILLIAM VALLANCE of Southchurch, Essex, (his brother) presumably as Executrix & Executor of the late JAMES VALLANCE & the children of THOMAS TONGE VALLANCE (including THOMAS WILLIAM VALLANCE acting as administrator for his late brother JAMES ATTWOOD VALLANCE) conveyed to the said THOMAS WILLIAM VALLANCE (in return for certain specified payments made to his sisters £983 to MARGARET ISABELLA, £925 to SARAH ANN MARIA, £985 to HARRIET & £728 - 13s - 6d divided between the three of them for their shares in the estate of their late brother JAMES ATTWOOD VALLANCE, the shares held by his sisters in the land, hereditaments & premises conveyed to THOMAS TONGE VALLANCE by his father WILLIAM VALLANCE in August 1818 as above.

NB the abstract makes the point that Margaret & Harriet were married & hence their respective husbands Cuthbert Edward Ellison & William Augustus Chaplin were parties thereto, as was Watson Coare, gentleman of King's Bench Walk in the Inner Temple, acting perhaps, on behalf of the unmarried Sarah Ann Maria or as joint administrator of the estate of James Attwood Vallance or in some other capacity which is not made clear.

27<sup>th</sup> July 1864

THOMAS WILLIAM VALLANCE sold to WILLIAM MAILE, auctioneer of Faversham who bought with WILLIAM JAMES HARRIS accountant for the sum of £8,000 some land extending to 39 acres, 3 roods & 20 perches with 13 cottages abutting on the **north** the Chatham & Canterbury turnpike road on the **east** lands belonging to the representatives of John Smith, Edward Twopenny & George Smeed on the **west** to the Queen's highway from Milton to Tunstall on the **south** to land belonging to the said George Smeed, the said Edward Twopenny & the said highway leading to Tunstall

Smeed & Twopenny occupied Gore Court & Woodstock respectively

except the premises then used a "lock up"
The land was then occupied by John Jarrett & the cottages by
William Smith & others

15th August 1864

Statutory declaration by GEORGE PAYNE gentleman (aged 52) that he was employed by THOMAS TONGE VALLANCE from before Vallance's marriage until his death & confirming that the above-mentioned 5 children were issue of the marriage & no more & that all of the children survived him.

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28th June 1866

FRANCIS RUSSELL & LEWIS DAVIS WIGAN sold to WILLIAM MAILE & WILLIAM JAMES HARRIS a piece of land on the south side of the road leading from Sittingbourne to Rochester 36 feet wide, 56 feet deep, abutting on the **south** the land described above on the **east** part of the said land "since sold off to Messrs Shepherd & Neame" & on the **west** to part of the said "since sold to Samuel Nuggleton together with the messuage or tenement ... formerly used as a lock up"

30<sup>th</sup> July 1872

WILLIAM JAMES HARRIS bought for £4,154 8s 0d WILLIAM MAILE's half share in the remaining land (34 acres 0 roods 20 perches of the original 39 acres, 3 roods 20 perches with 2 narrow strips of land, of which they had reserved some 3 feet of width or thereabouts on the east & north sides) through & over which they had "made & completed ....... certain roads or streets then called Park Road & William Street & other roads not named according to the plan"

Park Road led to Gore Court Park. Perhaps William Street was named after the developers

WILLIAM JAMES HARRIS, gentleman sold to

30<sup>th</sup> September 1880

DANIEL WILLS, Brickmaker a parcel of land on the east side of Park Road, Sittingbourne for the sum of £150
Plan shows frontage of 60 feet & that Harris retained the land to the west, H Iron (or, as he is described in the narrative wording, Henry Irons) held land to the south flank (131 feet) & W Cremer to the north flank (129 feet)
Mr Wills covenants that "no house or other building to be ......erected on the said piece or parcel of land...... shall be of less value than two hundred pounds or less than three storeys high............ no such house ......shall project beyond the building line........... no such house ......shall be used as....a house for the sale of Ale Beer Porter Stout or other Malt Liquors or as a Beer House, Public House, or Inn Refreshment House or Victualling House"

No fear of any such capers - Wills & Packham were strictly teetotal – unlike other barge builders, their launch parties were very restrained occasions.

Wills also undertook to maintain fences 6 foot high on the **south** flank & **rear** boundaries.

#### Garfield House 5/9

18th October 1881

WILLIAM JAMES HARRIS, gentleman sold to DANIEL WILLS, brickmaker, a parcel of land "on the Vallenciennes estate" (abutting on the east side a road, recently laid out by the said W J Harris) for the sum of £126

One might suppose that the name of the estate (with its particular spelling) derives from the family name of Vallance & gave rise to the name of Valenciennes Road

Plan shows frontage of 60 feet to what became Albany Street (& later Albany Road) & a similar width to the **rear** abutting the parcel bought in 1881. Harris retained the land on either side, with a depth of 125 feet 6 inches to the **north** & 128 feet 6 inches to the **south.** 

Mr Wills undertook covenants similar to those above The witness, as before, was Allan Tassell, solicitor of Faversham

19th September 1912

Will of DANIEL WILLS named as Executors his sons GEORGE HENRY WILLS, JABEZ WILLS & his friend CHARLES CREMER & gave a life interest to his wife ELIZA WILLS in certain parts of his estate

7<sup>th</sup> July 1920

codicil revoked appointment of CHARLES CREMER & the bequest made to him

1<sup>st</sup> November 1920

DANIEL WILLS died

12<sup>th</sup> April 1922

said GEORGE HENRY WILLS of 52 Park Road, Sittingbourne, Company Director & said JABEZ WILLS of 8 Royal Esplanade, Westbrook, Margate, Brick Manufacturer conveyed to ERNEST ALBERT CROWHURST Retired Superintendant of Police in consideration of £1,130 a "parcel of land ....bounded on the **west** by Park Road....having a frontage ....of sixty feet ...bounded on the **east** by ....Albany Street...having a frontage of sixty feet

bounded on the **north** in part by land owned by William Cremer & in part by Edward Bishop containing 254 feet 6 inches on the **south** in part land owned by Miriam Taylor & in part by Executors of John Stonehouse Budds containing 259 feet 6 ins together with the messuage known as "Garfield House, Park Road, Sittingbourne erected thereon – *where the buyer was living at the time*.

The land remained subject to the same covenants as before. Witnessed by F V Budden Solicitor of Sittingbourne – partner in the firm of Harris, Budden & Harris

In due course Mr Budden left the firm under a cloud, because of excessive consumption of alcohol. The problem had grown unbeknown to Budden's partners, one of whom, Cecil Harris, described the problem afterwards to a client of the firm as "the worm in the wood".

#### Garfield House 6/9

George Webb married Miss Murton of Tunstall House, in which building he was practising as a Land Agent & Land Surveyor in the mid 19<sup>th</sup> century, continuing, I have been told, the practice begun by his father-in-law.

In 1878 the business moved to 51 High Street Sittingbourne – perhaps George had died or retired. In the mid 20<sup>th</sup> century, 51 High Street became the office of solicitors Harris & Harris. Before that, they occupied 37/39 Park Road, (which was perhaps built by William James Harris) adjoining Garfield House.

In 1895 Geo Webb & Co moved to 81 High Street (where they were first connected to the telephone - Sittingbourne 57- in 1905) They were succeeded there by Barclays Bank, who perhaps made the partners a tempting offer.

In 1922 they came to to Garfield House – more space at a lower rate per square foot than the High Street. Not every partner of the firm has held an interest in the building

31st August 1922

ERNEST ALBERT CROWHURST sold Garfield House for

£1,500 to RICHARD WILLIAM COWPER

WALTER ROBINSON ELGAR

ARTHUR SAPTE WEBB – the last partner of the founding

family

WILLIAM SHAPLAND COWPER

BRIDGES ROPER DIXON carrying on business in copartnership as Land Agents & Valuers all of 81 High Street Sittingbourne

Witnessed by Cecil Harris, solicitor of Sittingbourne

In a bare 4 months Crowhurst made 33% profit

- Daniel Wills, a canny business man, would not have been impressed.

11th August 1924

the above purchasers, having carried on in a partnership the business of Land Agents & Valuers under the name of G Webb & Co, &

NIGEL EDWARD BERESFORD ELGAR conveyed to GEORGE FREDERICK JAQUES

a portion of the land with a frontage to Albany Street of 45 feet

at the **rear** 44 feet 6 inches a depth on the **north** of 126 feet

& on the **south** 128 feet No price is mentioned

The house built on the site is known as St Stephens. Some time later, part of this site at the north corner measuring 10 feet 6 inches by 14feet 3 inches reverted to Garfield House Among the deeds there is no documentation recording this transaction – nor the slicing away of a small triangle at the north corner, which appears in later plans.

25th August 1930 ARTHUR SAPTE WEBB at his own request was discharged

from the trusteeship, bringing to an end the original family
